Day 1 - 4 | Welcome to Victoria Falls

Today is a travel day

Airport Transfer

On arrival at Livingstone Airport, you will be warmly welcomed by a representative of Zafaris Travel Group and transferred by road to Chundukwa River Lodge.

Livingstone

This laidback and friendly border town on the edge of the Zambezi River is named after famous Scottish explorer and missionary Sir David Livingstone, the first non-Zambian to encounter the majestic Victoria Falls in 1855. It serves as a hub for exploring the further reaches of Zambia and offers a multitude of activities for adrenaline junkies, including white water rafting, gorge swinging, jet boating, microlight plane rides, elephant back safaris, and bungee jumping off the Victoria Falls bridge which, at 111 meters (364 ft), is one of the highest bridge jumps in the world.

While fisherman angle for Tigerfish upstream, downstream the Zambezi River rages with up to grade 5 rapids, such as the aptly named 'overland truck eater.' During the drier months, a rock pool known as Devil's Pool forms on the edge of the Falls, creating the ultimate infinity pool. During a full moon, especially from June to August, visitors have the chance to witness a lunar rainbow over the Falls at night.

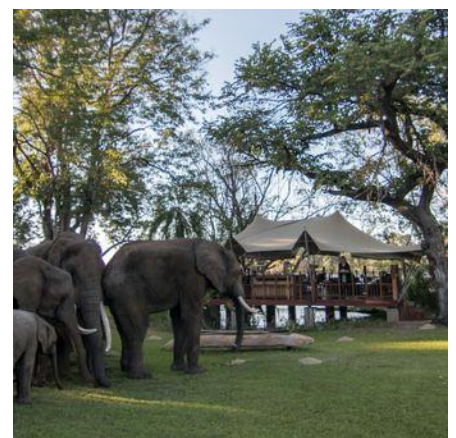
Peace is found in the flow of a river, and eco-friendly, luxurious guest rooms all face the Zambezi. Chundukwa River Lodge is owner-run and a champion of locally made and personal hospitality.

The boutique bush lodge has five intimate, river-facing guest chalets, open-fronted for a greater connection with nature, and one riverside family cottage. You'll hear hippos grunting every evening, before they come onto the property to graze the lawns behind the chalets.

Chundukwa River Lodge is a destination in itself, half an hour's drive from Livingstone, 36km upstream of the Victoria Falls. Retreat, relax, recover, horse-ride, bird-watch, cruise on the Zambezi, explore the Victoria Falls and try some of the adventure and safari activities in the area. This patch of paradise has been in the family for over 50 years. The lodge is renowned for its riding stables with horses for all abilities, child-friendly farmyard animals, delightful staff and delicious meals.

Experience & Activities

The essence of the Chundukwa experience comes through in the combination of the Victoria Falls Day Trip, together with time spent enjoying all that the lodge has to offer. Whether you are seeking to see and experience the Falls in as many ways as possible, or adrenaline-inducing



adventures, or just a tranquil bush experience, Chundukwa can book and arrange all your activities for your time, and put together an itinerary tailored to you.

The Fully Inclusive package includes a sunset or sunrise boat cruise, as well as a private guide and vehicle to take you to Victoria Falls, transfer you between your chosen activities, and guide you around Livingstone. There is a stable yard with horses for riders of any experience. Birding, white rhino tracking, engaging with the local culture, and taking historical tours mean that you'll never be short of something to do.

Kafue National Park

Kafue was established by the legendary Norman Carr in the 1950s and is Zambia's oldest and largest national park. Covering a massive 22,400 km² (8,650 mi²), the park is dominated by Miombo woodlands and interspersed with seasonal floodplains, rivers, and dambos - the dry riverbeds that provide seasonal refuge for the wide variety of wildlife. In fact, Kafue boasts more species than any other park south of the Congo.

Wildlife sightings can be very good with large herds of lechwe and buffalo in the floodplains, alongside all the predators of which lions are very well represented. There is also excellent birdlife.

Day 4 - 7 | Musekese Camp

Property Overview

Musekese Camp is perched on the edge of a spectacular lagoon hidden away from the outside world. The camp has made a name for itself with expert guiding, exceptional food, and phenomenal wildlife viewing.

Musekese Camp has only five chalets, taking a maximum of ten people. There's a minimum of two guides on hand at any time, which means you are entirely assured of activities taken at your pace and interest.

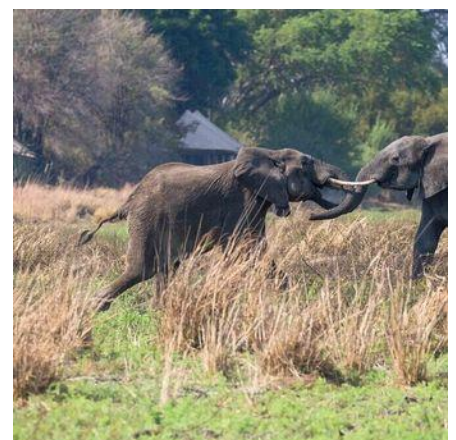
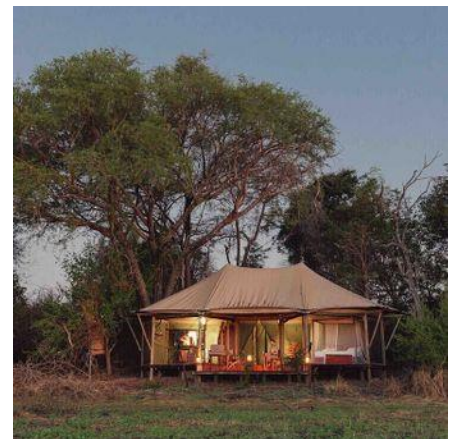
Experience & Activities

Explore this game-rich area by vehicle, foot or boat along the emerald green Kafue River.

The wildlife viewing in and around Musekese is exceptional. All the major predators are present, with leopard and lion very well represented. Elephant herds are always visible in the dry season months and the plains game is as numerous as it is varied from sable and hartebeest to zebra and puku (puku in their hundreds!). Birding is top-class, with hundreds of species recorded in and around the Musekese area. There is also an elevated hide overlooking the northern portion of the Eden Lagoon.

Musekese Conservation

Musekese Conservation is a Zambian run Non- Profit organisation that helps to provide resources for conservation projects working across the



Musekese-Lumbeya area. The primary focus is to establish law enforcement and research initiatives that contribute to the preservation of wildlife and communities within the Kafue National Park.

Airport Transfer

On arrival at Mfuwe Airport, you will be met and transferred by road to Flatdogs Camp

South Luangwa National Park

South Luangwa is 9,060 km² (3,500 mi²) in size and has incredibly diverse landscapes ranging from dense forests of mopane, ebony and sausage trees to wide open savanna punctuated only by the occasional lonely baobab - all hugged by the wide and winding Luangwa River. The river is the most intact major river system in Africa and the lifeblood of this park. The now famous “walking safari” originated here and is still one of the finest ways to experience Africa’s pristine wilderness firsthand. The changing seasons add to the park’s richness, from dry bushveld in the winter to lush wonderland in the summer months.

60 different animal species and over 400 different bird species live in South Luangwa National Park. The only notable exception is the rhino,



sadly poached to extinction. Aptly named the Valley of the Leopard, it is widely considered one of the best places in Southern Africa to look for these elusive cats. With an estimated 50 hippos per kilometer of the Luangwa River, it's a very popular destination for them too.

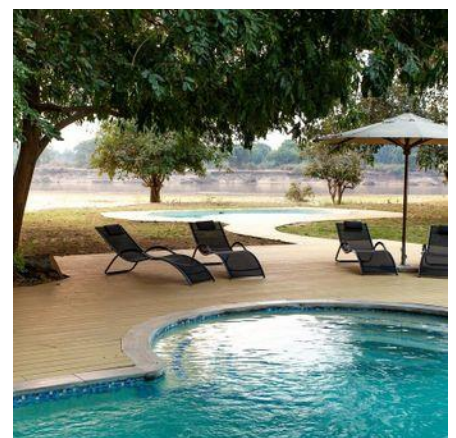
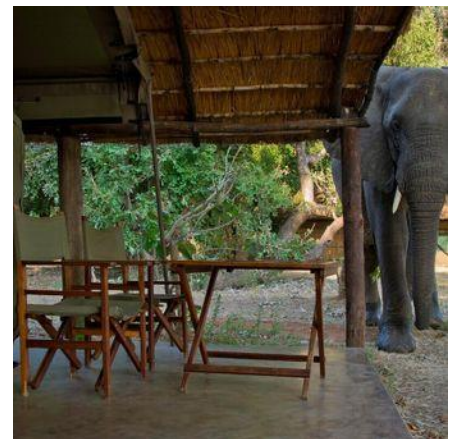
Flatdogs Camp is on the border of the South Luangwa National Park, one of the last great wildlife wonders of the world. It is nine thousand square kilometers (3,475 square miles) of pristine wilderness and Flatdogs offers the perfect gateway. The South Luangwa NP has been visited by wildlife enthusiasts from all over the world since its creation in 1972.

Flatdogs takes pride in offering accommodation to rival the up-market lodges, at a fraction of the cost. The range of South Luangwa accommodation options aims to suit all kinds of varied hominids – there are cool and spacious Chalet rooms, the wild & unique Jackalberry Treehouse, the airy Safari Tents with 270° views and the top level bliss of the Crocodile Nest. There is also a swimming pool, WiFi in the main area, a book swap, and curio shop supporting local artists and artisans.

Flatdogs is unique in many ways, one of which is definitely the restaurant! There are no set meals or meal times here - guests can order what they'd like to eat, when they'd like to eat it. Guests are welcome to sit inside under the thatch, at tables in the courtyard or in the garden area looking out towards the river.

The Luangwa Valley is home to an astonishing diversity of life, including around 100 species of mammals, more than 400 bird species and over 2000



types of plants! Added to this, there's an amazing density of game, particularly along the riverine strip and our guests often comment that 'there's something around every corner!'

Flatdogs Camp is the closest camp to the Mfuwe main gate, which provides access to the South Luangwa National Park. Flatdogs conducts professionally-guided game viewing activities in the National Park, including morning drives, night drives and walking safaris.

Safari Tent

On the bank of the Luangwa with the best views in camp sit 6 luxury en-suite safari tents. These tents are spacious enough for full-sized beds, hanging rack for clothes, bedside tables and lamps. A door leads into a shaded open-air bathroom with hot shower, flush toilet and basin. The luxury tents have mosquito nets and electric fans as well as fully gauzed windows. One of the river-front tents is a family tent which has a double bed and 2 single beds, and one large en-suite bathroom. The 7th luxury tent is a honeymoon tent which looks out onto a lovely waterhole. The honeymoon tent has a private setting and claw foot tub.

Day 10 - 13 | South Luangwa to Lower Zambezi National Park

Airport Transfer

This morning following breakfast and an activity (time permitting), you will be transferred to Mfuwe airport.

Scheduled light aircraft charter

On arrival at Mfuwe Airport, you will connect to your scheduled light aircraft charter into the Lower Zambezi National Park (via Lusaka).

Lower Zambezi National Park

Lower Zambezi National Park covers an area of 4,092 km² (1,580 mi²), with game concentrated on the valley floor. There is an escarpment along the northern end which acts as a physical barrier to most of the park's resident wildlife, and enormous herds of elephant, some up to 100 strong, are often seen at the river's edge. The riverine woodland includes ebony, fig, and Albida trees, whose seed pods are a huge attraction to the elephants and browsing animals. Further inland is a floodplain fringed with Mopane forest interspersed with winter thorns and huge Acacias.

The hills which form the backdrop to the park are covered in broadleaf woodland and on the opposite bank of the river lies Zimbabwe's Mana Pools. Animals can be seen crossing from one side to the other.

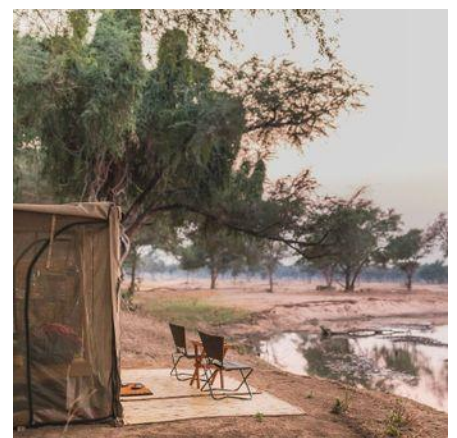

Beat Malaria

Africa is full of bugs that come in all shapes and sizes, most are benign creatures looking to live out their lifecycles in peace and harmony. Some have stings that can really hurt (and may need medical attention) and others bite, leaving nasty, itchy bites. But when it comes to mosquitoes, they can leave more than just a red, swollen itch machine...

Malaria is a real threat, especially during the rainy season when the anopheles mosquito that carries malaria is breeding. It's the females that bite and spread the disease, which can, in some cases, make you really ill. So please take malaria seriously and take action to prevent infection. Here are some tips to help you...

Prevention better than cure

The best way to prevent malaria is to take prophylaxis and use an anti-malarial drug.

We can recommend Malanil or Malarone as well as Mozitec. Consult your doctor for more information and check for any contra-indications with medicine you already take as well as possible side effects you need to be aware of.

Cover up, buttercup and spray, spray, spray

When the sun starts to sink, put on long pants and long sleeves to minimise possible bites and spray the hell out of your legs and arms (even covered) with a good bug spray or smear with a bug stick. Don't forget your ears! And cheeks! And ankles.

Mozzies love ankles.

Doom your room

Use bug spray to knock down insects in your room or tent at night, before you go to dinner. Give it a good all-over spray, shut the doors/flaps and walk away. Here in Sarf Efrica we have a spray called Doom. Others are called Target, Peaceful Sleep and Morein.

For the majority of accommodations, your room is prepared for you by the wonderful house keepers so no need to worry about the above.

Use your mozzie net

That gorgeous, diaphanous netting around your bed is not a romantic come-on, it's designed to keep winged, bitey things at bay. So use it. Along with all of the above.

We'll give you the full lowdown on where you're going and what the risks are in terms of malaria so that you can make an informed choice about how to prevent it.



It's all in the detail

We kindly request that our guests adhere to the smaller charter flight rules and regulations regarding baggage limitations when flying throughout Southern or East Africa. This does not apply to your International, Regional or Domestic flights with commercial airlines.

Due to the nature of charter and shuttle flight services, aircraft are smaller than typical airliners and therefore have much smaller luggage holds.

Need to Know

Luggage is restricted to 20 kg per person on charter flights.

Bags should be soft-sided, flexible bags.

Bags with a solid frame do not constitute 'soft bags'.

Bags **MUST** be completely flexible to facilitate being stowed in the 'belly pod' luggage compartment of the light inter-camp transfer aircraft.

By not adhering to these luggage requirements, travellers stand to cause delays and incur additional costs to themselves.

This 20 kg includes both hand luggage and travel luggage.
